

8 Practical Ways To Grow Your Church



For this installment of my pastor's part of the newsletter, I thought I would include an article I recently saw from a site called "The Babylonian Bee." This is a blog done by conservative Christians who use sarcasm to make a point about ministry and the church today. This is Sarcasm at its best! I love sarcasm...God invented it by the way! Printed below is a wonderfully sarcastic piece on how to "grow" a church. Please make sure to understand before you read it that THIS IS SARCASM...NOT what we would ever want to do in the church. The piece is written to show and get you to feel the real danger that for many churches today is common practice. Hope you enjoy!

"Are you in church leadership? If so, you know as well as anyone how tough business is right now. Gone are the days of triple-digit revenue growth and billion-dollar IPOs. But listen—don't let the challenging marketplace get you down. Instead, get creative. Here are 7 practical ways to get butts in seats and bottom lines heading north:

- 1. Pander, pander. The first rule of church growth is to constantly compromise whatever deep convictions and sincere beliefs you might have in order to make visitors feel special. Sometimes, you even need to just ask people point-blank what it is you can compromise to get them to start attending your church regularly.
- 2. Study what the Bible teaches about the local church, so you know what not to do. Read up carefully on concepts like elders, deacons, and the gathering of the Lord's people, and then laugh about it with your executive business pastor later. People do not want this stuff. You're too cutting-edge for it, anyways.
- **3. Two words: surprise baptisms.** Hide in the bushes around your community, and jump out with super-soakers to baptize passersby. New members! Then just throw some tithing envelopes at them and make your escape. (Two more words: dancing bears—just trust us here.)
- 4. Lower the bar for membership. Every local church should be easier to join than the Burger King Kid's Club. They come to church once per year? No problem. They're living an unrepentant, egregiously sinful lifestyle? Hey—who are you to judge? They can't even articulate the gospel at a Tiny Tots level? Psshh, bring 'em in! You're not going to grow this thing by turning people away! Extra tip: even let unregenerate folks fill leadership roles—you want everyone to really feel welcome.
- 5. Design your church to look like a shopping mall. When visitors wander in to pick up a coffee or go shopping in one of your bookstores or clothing stalls, ideally, they won't even know they're in a church. Some of the most successful churches even keep their members in the dark about their true identity as a place of worship for years. The early church did this all the time—that's how they grew so fast.
- **6. Don't ask people to serve.** This should go without saying, but there are still a lot of backwards churches out there that ask people other than the well-paid staff to help out and serve the body of Christ. Remember that it's all about making people feel comfortable, rather than offering a place where they can be a part of something bigger than themselves. Say it with us: *the customer is always right!*
- 7. Whatever else you do, don't preach the gospel. This is the golden rule of church growth, and one that—amazingly—some churches are still ignoring. Teaching that people are naturally dead in their sins and need a Savior is very, very bad for business. If you're going to tell people that Jesus is the only hope any of us have, you might as well tell them to take their business elsewhere next Sunday!

BEEF, Preparing for human Consumption

An abattoir is a synonym for a slaughterhouse. Butchery is a craft as ancient as civilization itself. From primitive tools to sophisticated techniques, the journey of meat processing is a testament to human innovation and adaptability.

1662: The meatpacking history is born. English colonists and fur trader William Pynchon was the founder of Springfield, Massachusetts. In 1662, he began the new world's first meat market when he began packing large quantities of salt pork into barrels for export to the West Indies.

1742: Brighton Market, located near Boston, held the first meat auction in the colonies. Cattle farmers and ranchers slaughtered animals and brought the resulting meat to Birmingham for sale. This positioned Boston as the new center of colonial America's meat trade.



Thoughts from BOB, the Blacksmith

In the early days of the United States, slaughterhouses were located near the center of industrializing cities, and they were often surrounded by other downtown businesses. Here are a few examples of early American slaughterhouses: Philadelphia Stockyard Company, a 21-acre complex, was located on the west banks of the Schuylkill River in Philadelphia. It included pins for cattle, hogs, and sheep; an abattoir; and administrative offices. The Chicago stockyards were a major tourist attraction. The stockyards were also a livestock market, while the packinghouse was a meat distribution plant.

New Orleans population grew quickly as the number of slaughterhouses increased rapidly. By 1868, there were more than 150 slaughterhouses in the area. They created quite a bit of waste material which was often dumped into the river and streets.

After the turn of the century, many small communities, cities, and rural areas found a need for local slaughter and butcher facilities to aid in the disbursement of locally raised cattle, hogs, and poultry, thus inviting private entrepreneurs to invest in those services.

The meat inspection act of 1906 was created after the public outcry over unsanitary conditions and inadequate inspections in the Chicago slaughterhouses. The act strengthened the requirements for sanitary conditions in all packinghouse and required inspections of meat and interstate commerce.

United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) required inspections to ensure official regulations are obeyed, especially in public services. The meat inspection act had a significant increase in overhead cost for small businesses.

What and When is Presidents' Day?



Is this Holiday called Presidents' Day or Washington's Birthday?

Although the holiday is most often called "Presidents' Day" the observed federal holiday is officially called "Washington's birthday." Neither Congress nor the president has ever stipulated that the name of the holiday observed as Washington's birthday be changed to Presidents' Day. Additionally, Congress has never declared a national holiday binding in all states; each state has the freedom to determine its legal holidays. This is why there are some calendar discrepancies when it comes to this holiday's date.

Presidents' Day History

Historically, Americans began celebrating George Washington's birthday just months after his death, long before Congress declared it a federal holiday. It was not until 1879, under President Rutherford B. Hayes, that Washington's birthday become a legal holiday, to be observed on his birthday, February 22. Washington's birthday was celebrated on February 22 until well into the 20th century. In 1968, congress passed the Monday Holiday Law to "provide uniform annual observances of certain legal public holidays on Mondays." By creating more 3-day weekends, Congress hoped to "bring substantial benefits to both the spiritual and economic life of the nation."

When is Presidents' Day?

Presidents' Day is observed annually on the third Monday in February. In 2025, Presidents' Day will be celebrated on Monday, February 17.

When is George Washington's Real Birthday?

Although the federal holiday is held on the third Monday of February, George Washington's birthday is observed on February 22. To complicate matters, Washington was actually born on February 11, 1731! How can that be? George Washington was born when the Julian calendar was in use. During Washington's lifetime, people in Great Britain and America switched the official calendar system from Julian to Gregorian calendar.






The Woodville Church library is overflowing with truth, adventure, History and grace.


Come check out our church library as we have added some new items to read, study and watch. There are new books for the children and pre teens too!



Food For Thought...

Baked Ziti

Recipe tested by Southern Living

Active Time: 40 mins

Total Time: 1 hr 5 mins Servings: 8

Ingredients

- 1 (1-lb.) pkg. ziti
- 3 Tbsp. olive oil, divided
- 1 lb. 90/10 lean ground beef
- 1 small (7 oz) yellow onion, finely chopped, about 1-1/4 cups
- 3 large garlic cloves, finely chopped (about 1 1/2 Tbsp.)
- 1 (28-oz.) can whole peeled plum tomatoes, crushed by hand
- 1 (24-oz.) jar marinara sauce
- 1 (15-oz.) container whole-milk ricotta cheese
- 1/3 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1 tsp. kosher salt
- 1/2 tsp. crushed red pepper
- 12 oz pre-shredded low-moisture part-skim mozzarella cheese (about 3 cups), divided
- 3 oz. Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese, grated (about 3/4 cup), divided
- · Chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

St. Patrick's Day Poke Cake

Prep Time 25 minutes **Cook Time** 30 minutes **Chilling time** 8 hours **Total Time** 8 hours 55 minutes **Servings**15 **Ingredients**

- 1 box white cake mix plus ingredients on the back (water, oil, egg whites) Baked at temperature that it calls for on box
- 1 box lime Jello 3-ounce size
- 2 cups water
- 8 ounces Cool Whip
- 1 box white chocolate instant pudding mix 3-ounce size
- 1/3 cup St. Patrick's Day sprinkles

Instructions

- 1. Prepare the cake batter according to package directions.
- 2. Pour the batter into a 13x9 inch pan and bake as directed, then place the baked cake on a wire rack and allow it to cool to room temperature.
- 3. Poke holes all over the top of the cake.
- 4. Bring 1 cup water to a boil in a medium saucepan, then remove from the heat and whisk in the lime Jello mix. Add 1 cup of cold water and stir until the mix is completely dissolved.
- 5. Pour Jello into the holes on top of the cake, then move the cake to the refrigerator to chill overnight.
- 6. Whisk together Cool Whip and white chocolate pudding mix in a large bowl until well combined.
- 7. Using a spatula or a knife, spread the whipped topping mixture over the top of the entire cake.
- 8. Sprinkle the St. Patrick's Day sprinkles on top of the cake.

Directions

1.Cook ziti:

Preheat oven to 375°F. Bring a large pot of salted water to a boil over high. Add ziti and cook, stirring occasionally, according to package directions for al dente, about 10 minutes. Drain ziti in a colander and toss with 1 tablespoon of the oil.

2.Cook ground beef:

While ziti cooks, heat remaining 2 tablespoons oil in a large Dutch oven over medium-high. Break ground beef into medium-sized clumps, and add to Dutch oven. Cook, stirring once halfway through cook time, until deeply browned on 2 sides, 6 to 8 minutes.

3.Break up ground beef into smaller pieces:

Cook, stirring and breaking up meat into smaller pieces with a wooden spoon, until cooked through and no longer pink, about 2 minutes.

4.Add garlic and onion:

Reduce heat to medium. Add onion and garlic, and cook, stirring often, until softened, about 3 minutes.

5.Make ragu:

Stir in plum tomatoes and marinara sauce. Bring to a simmer over medium. Cover, and simmer, stirring occasionally, until slightly thickened, 10 to 12 minutes. Remove from heat, and set aside 3 cups of the ragu.

6.Add cheeses, cream, and seasoning to ragu:

Add ricotta, cream, salt, crushed red pepper, 2 cups of the mozzarella, and 1/2 cup of the Parmigiano-Reggiano to remaining ragu in Dutch oven, and stir to combine. Add cooked ziti, and stir until thoroughly combined.

7. Assemble casserole:

To assemble, spread 1 cup of the reserved ragu in the bottom of a 13- x 9-inch baking dish. Spoon half of the ziti mixture over ragu. Spoon 1 cup of the reserved ragu over ziti mixture.

Spoon remaining ziti mixture over ragu. Spread remaining 1 cup reserved ragu over ziti mixture, and sprinkle with remaining 1 cup mozzarella and 1/4 cup Parmigiano-Reggiano.


8.Bake:

Bake, uncovered, in preheated oven until cheese is melted and browned in spots, 20 to 25 minutes. Let cool 5 minutes. Garnish with parsley.


